PET CARE CORNER

How Often Should I Clip My Pet's Nails?

Animal claws will naturally wear down through activity, but when kept indoors, their nails need to be trimmed more frequently since they tend to be less active and walk on softer surfaces.

Cats try to relieve this problem by using your sofa, carpet or curtains to sharpen their claws. For cats, trimming every 10-14 days will keep your pet healthy.

A sure sign that your dog's nails are too long is when their paws make a clicking sound when they walk on hard surfaces. Dogs need their nails clipped approximately every 3-4 weeks. Waiting too long between trimmings can cause a number of physical problems for the animal. Birds, rabbits, guinea pigs, and other exotic small pets need their nails trimmed regularly as well, something that most people don't realize.




What Happens When Your Pet's Nails are Not Trimmed?

Consistent nail maintenance isn't simply cosmetic. In some cases, nails can cause pain and trigger irreversible damage to the animal. When people think of the damage a pet's nails can cause, most consider scratches on hardwood floors, carpet snags, and claw marks on furniture. However, long nails create potential health issues for animals — a splayed foot, reduced traction, deformed feet, and even injured tendons over time. As long nails hit the ground, it puts force on the foot and leg structure. This force can potentially lead to arthritis and ongoing pain.

The growth pattern of a dog's nails forms a curved shape. If left untrimmed, the claws will eventually curve under the dog's paws and dig into the skin, creating pain when they walk. If you have ever experienced an ingrown toenail then you are familiar with the type of pain a curved pet nail can cause. To compensate for this discomfort, dogs will put more weight on their back paws than their front. This can lead to sore muscles and joints, backaches, and eventually arthritis. Longer nails can also snag carpets and get caught on fabrics. This can lead to exposure of the inside of the nail known as the quicked claw can cause. To compensate for this discomfort, dogs will put more weight on their back paws than their front, causing sore muscles and joints, backaches, and eventually arthritis.

Even though their veterinarian recommends trimming cat's claws, many pet owners do not adhere to this. In some instances, cats can be so destructive that owners choose to declaw them, leaving the cat defenseless if caught outside or in an altercation with another animal. The solution is to reduce the cat's ability to damage by scratching with a regular nail-trimming routine. Keeping a cat's nails trimmed will potentially prevent nail damage to home furnishings by reducing their urge to claw.

Fishing Report: Week of March 22, 2023 from Michigan DNR

Little Bay de Noc: Anglers reported fair to good perch fishing, with varying degrees of success day-to-day. Anglers were fishing the mud flats, as well as deep water near reefs. Anglers were having most action when using wigglers. Anglers on the mud flats, and in front of Kipling, were having to sort through small fish.

Keweenaw Bay: Anglers were out every day in front of the Falls River and out in deeper water from the Baraga boat launch. The main catch in front of the Falls River was coho salmon with a mix of rainbow trout and brown trout occasionally. Anglers used a wide range of tactics to pull in these fish from using artificial and natural baits to using tip-ups and active jigging techniques. In the deeper water, anglers were actively jigging with both natural and artificial baits and mostly caught whitefish with herring being a substantial portion of the catch as well. Anglers in both locations found their best fishing during the mornings and early afternoons. Some anglers were fishing through the ice for smelt as they are reporting clouds of smelt below the ice.

Les Cheneaux: Anglers were doing well catching splake in Wilderness Bay; however, just recently the ice conditions have deterio-

rated. Hessel Bay was slowly breaking up. Anglers were still catching a few perch in the area. Anglers are getting anxious for dock fishing.

TAKE CAUTION: If you are to head onto Hessel Bay, be cautious and avoid the boat launch area. The tugboat tried to get out of the marina and has that whole area of ice broken up and unsafe to be on.

Munising: Anglers reported that the best time for fishing was in the mornings. Fishing pressure was low with a few more coho reported over the weekend. Anglers also reported scattered catches of splake and herring. Whitefish anglers reported low catches. Only scattered reports of smelt/ burbot for night anglers.

Marquette: Fishing picked up in the Marquette area with increased fishing activity and anglers successfully catching fish. Rainbow trout were slowly running in the Carp River, but no word on any fish species other than brown trout out of the Chocolay.

NOTE: The DNR plans on expanding its weekly fishing report in the future to include more Western U.P. areas. Stay tuned!

USE CAUTION ON THE ICY LAKE SHORES!



NOTICE OF PROJECT PLANNING PUBLIC MEETING

The **Township of McMillan**, Ontonagon County will hold a public meeting on the proposed sewer improvements project for the purpose of receiving comments from interested persons.

The meeting will be held at 5 p.m. on April 19, 2023 at the Township Office.

The purpose of the proposed project is to perform repairs and adjustments to the sewer system to improve operations and maintain the system to meet the NPDES permit and EGLE requirements for operating.

Project construction will involve, but may not be limited to: repairs to existing sewer lines, relocation of sewer structures from ditch lines, repairs to manholes and lift stations, replacement of lift station equipment, replacement of the existing force main from the main lift station to the lagoons, adding SCADA controls to the lift stations, lagoon sludge removal, improving the access roads at the lagoons, correcting pipe connections at the lagoons and constructing a storage facility for equipment.

Impacts of the proposed project include improving operational efficiencies by repairing broken or aging infrastructure and adding SCADA controls for lift stations, reducing I&I in the system to mitigate non-permitted discharges from the lagoons, and improving lagoon treatment by performing sludge removal.

The estimate cost to users for the proposed project will be \$2,000,000.

Children living in poverty experience more abuse and neglect. Experiencing poverty can place a lot of stress on families, which may increase the risk for child abuse and neglect. Rates are 5X higher for children in families with low socioeconomic status.

The youngest children are the most vulnerable. More than 1/4 (27.8%) of victims are in the age range of birth through 2 years old.

Child abuse and neglect are common. At least 1 in 7 children have experienced child abuse or neglect in the past year in the United States.

Child abuse and neglect are serious public health problems and adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). They can have long-term impacts on health, opportunity, and wellbeing. This issue includes all types of abuse and neglect of a child under the age of 18 by a parent, caregiver, or another person in a custodial role (such as a religious leader, a coach, a teacher) that results in harm, the potential for harm, or threat of harm to a child. There are four common types of abuse and neglect:

- **Physical abuse** is the intentional use of physical force that can result in physical injury. Examples include hitting, kicking, shaking, burning, or other shows of force against a child.
- Sexual abuse involves pressuring or forcing a child to engage in sexual acts. It includes behaviors such as fondling, penetration, and exposing a child to other sexual activities.
- Emotional abuse refers to behaviors that harm a child's self-worth or emotional well-being. Examples include name-calling, shaming, rejecting, withholding love, and threatening.
- **Neglect** is the failure to meet a child's basic physical and emotional needs. These needs include housing, food, clothing, education, access to medical care, and having feelings validated and appropriately responded to.

Several approaches seek to enhance parenting skills and promote healthy child development in ways that prevent child abuse and neglect. There are many programs and resources available to help caregivers. To access help with food, housing, bill payment, and family support through Michigan call 2-1-1: 24 Hours a Day, 7 Days a Week, 365 Days A Year.

Road Commission To Ask For Millage Renewal

On June 13, 1983 the Ontonagon County Road Commission will ask the voters of the County to again renew a 5 mill snow removal and construction millage. This is not a new tax but one which has been voted since 1936 when it was for two mills. In 1939 the millage was increased to three mills and in 1948 it was increased to its present 5 mills.

The five mills is the only money which the Road Commission receives from the county taxes and it constitutes about one-third of the available income for county roads.

The millage also includes funds for the Village of Ontonagon. Because they are an incorporated village all taxes collected within the village are retained by them for their snow removal and street construction. By mutual agreement the Village assumed plowing their streets a few years ago, previously the County did their plowing.

The millage received by the Road Commission is used for snow removal, including plowing private driveways and construction on county roads. Because the Road Commission receives the 5 mills the various townships are only required to contribute one-third of the cost of construction on local county roads. Other Road Commissions require anywhere from 75% to 100% of construction costs.

Although the ballot wording implies the millage is an increase, it is a renewal and not an increase over last year. Election laws require the wording to state it is an increase and does not permit the use of the word renewal.






