

FAVORITE THINGS - SUNFLOWER SPROUTS

SUNFLOWER SPROUTS have a crisp, fresh, and slightly nutty flavor well suited for fresh and cooked preparations. The greens can be used raw in any recipe requiring added texture and are typically tossed into salads, layered into sandwiches, wraps, and quesadillas, rolled into sushi, blended into smoothies, or stirred into grain bowls. The sprouts can also be chopped for pesto and other creamy dips. In addition to fresh dishes, Sunflower sprouts can be added at the end of heated

preparations to prevent wilting. The greens can be floated on soups, incorporated into mashed potatoes or omelets, mixed into rice, or stir-fried with vegetables or noodles. Sunflower sprouts pair well with vegetables such as radishes, carrots, and kohlrabi, tomatoes, meats such as ham, turkey, and poultry, apples, and herbs including basil, parsley, and dill. The sprouts will keep 2 to 5 days when stored unwashed in a sealed plastic bag in the refrigerator.

Loaner car while you wait 9 Ways to Pack Extra **Nutritional Punch** Into Your Meals with **Microgreens and Shoots** The next time you're in the grocery store, look for microgreens and shoots - or try your hand at growing your own, and then: 1. Add a handful of microgreens or shoots to your salad (lettuce, spinach, etc.). Use as a replacement for lettuce in a sandwich, wrap, burger, burrito, or taco. Depending on your taste, you might like pea shoots or sunflower shoots on sandwiches, mild microgreens in wraps, spicy mix microgreens on tacos, or arugula microgreens on burgers. Add them to smoothies. It's better to stick with milder flavors like pea shoots 3 and mild mix microgreens so the desired smoothie flavor isn't overwhelmed. Use them alone as a side salad and dress them how you would like. Add a handful to your soup or a bowl of steamed veggies right before you eat. Pea shoots and sunflower shoots are the most durable and longest lasting, and they're easy to take with you for an on-the-go snack. EXTRA TIP: Pea shoots are a kid-favorite snack. Make pesto with your microgreens and shoots. Any green thing can turn into pesto! If you have a bag or 2 of micro greens or shoots that need to be used, don't compost them, make pesto instead! Use a standard basil pesto recipe, just substitute whatever micro greens you have for the basil in the recipe.

- You can then freeze the pesto in ice cube trays and add the frozen cubes to soup or thaw them for future sauce. No waste!
- 8. Eat them for breakfast on top of scrambled eggs, or on top of your omelet right before you dig in, or mix them into your breakfast potatoes.

Lou Conter - the last survivor of USS Arizona dies at 102 The sole survivor serving aboard the USS Arizona during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor has died.

Lou Conter, one of the last living ties to that date of infamy, passed away on April 1, 2024, at his home in Grass, Valley, California. He was 102. Born in Ojibwa, Wisconsin, Conter enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1939 at the age of 18. Two years later, he would bear witness to the attack that finally drew the United States into the Second World War. Starting his shift as quartermaster at 7:45 a.m. on Dec. 7, 1941, Conter had barely rubbed the sleep from his eyes when the Japanese assault began a mere three minutes later. At exactly 8:09 a.m., the hull of the USS Arizona was struck by a 1,760-pound Japanese armor-piercing bomb.

Japanese horizontal bombers swirling overhead continued to cause damage, striking the Arizona's midship areas. The massive explosion that soon followed has never been explained, according to the Naval History and Heritage Command, since the bomb did not pierce Arizona's armored deck. It is believed, however, that the bomb that penetrated her forward turrets struck nearly one million pounds of gunpowder, causing the turrets, conning tower and much of the superstructure to be obliterated. The ship continued to burn for more than 48 hours after the attack.

"Minute it happened, we sounded general quarters and they were in there and we blew up in about eight minutes, nine minutes," Conter told CBS13 in 2022. Knocked over from the blast, Conter landed on the deck which was rapidly filling with water.

Despite the conflagration spreading throughout the badly listing ship, Conter remained composed,

spending nearly 35 minutes attempting to secure the quarterdeck and saving nearly 20 sailors. Of the 2,403 American sailors, soldiers and civilians killed that day, 1,177 came from Arizona's crew. Conter was just one of 335 aboard the battleship to survive. But his duty to Arizona's crew did not cease on December 7. Conter joined numerous rescue operations to recover the bodies of his shipmates in the chaotic days that followed the attack. However, after five days of "diligently searching, it was apparent that no one remained alive, and the risk of the operation became too high to continue," according to a Veterans Affairs release. "Although most of the fuel aboard the ship fed the explosion, 500,000 gallons slowly seeped from the wreckage," the release said. "Nearly 80 years after the attack, the USS Arizona continues to spill up to 9 quarts of oil per day into the harbor. This is often referred to as the 'tears of the Arizona.""

Nearly 900 sailors still lie entombed in the USS Arizona. Following the attack on Pearl Harbor, Conter entered flight school, serving as a pilot with the Navy Squadron dubbed the Black Cats due to black paint adorning the night-flying PBY Catalinas, according to VA News.

Conter survived the war, despite being shot down twice over the Pacific, and went on to serve in Korea as an air intelligence officer. Upon returning home, he worked to establish the Navy's first SERE — Survival, Evasion, Resistance, and Escape — program and served as a military adviser to Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson. Conter retired from the Navy as a lieutenant commander after 28 years of military service. Today, fewer than two dozen survivors of the attack on Pearl Harbor attack remain alive.



400,000+ veterans enrolled in VA health care over past 365 days, 30% increase over last year

On Friday (3/29/24), the Department of Veterans Affairs announced that it has enrolled 401,006 veterans in VA health care over the past 365 days — 30% more than the 307,831 it enrolled the previous year. This is the most yearly enrollees in at least the past five years at VA, and nearly a 50%increase over pandemic-level enrollment in 2020. The number of new enrollees increased in all 50 states year-over-year. Amongst the states with the most new enrollees is Michigan with 9,294. This historic enrollment has been made possible by the bipartisan PACT Act — signed into law by President Biden as a part of his Unity Agenda for the nation — which allowed VA to expand VA health care and benefits to millions of veterans.

Watersmeet Township Has a New Emergency Community Alert System: You Must Register to Receive Alerts

Receiving instantaneous emergency notifications (e.g., safety threats, severe weather, traffic warnings, etc.) regarding events impacting the Watersmeet Township community is now easier thanks to a new partnership between the Township and CodeRED[®]. CodeRED is a critical communication service that enables our Township officials to send notifications regarding time-sensitive information, emergencies, or other urgent situations (see examples below) to registered individuals' phone numbers (landline and/or mobile), and/ or by text (SMS) message, and/or by email. This is a FREE service.

Registration is required in order to receive the alerts. Enrollment can be completed in just a few minutes using an internet-connected computer or mobile device. To enroll by computer, open the web browser and go to https://accountportal.onsolve.net/watersmeet. Or, to enroll using an internet-connected mobile device, text the word "NIMROD" to the number 24639, then click the web address link provided in the text to complete the enrollment steps. TIP: If you enroll for mobile phone call alerts or text (SMS) message alerts, be sure to add "CodeRED" as new Contact in your mobile device with the number as 206-536-3695 so that you can easily recognize incoming CodeRED calls or texts.

Any message regarding a threat of life or property to our residents and community will be disseminated using CodeRED. Only Township officials have the authority to send alerts. Examples of situations where a CodeRED alert may be sent to registered individuals include boil water notices, gas leaks, evacuation notices, police activity, fire emergencies, and missing persons. General announcements, lost pets, meeting notices, etc., will continue to be sent via email through the Watersmeet news subscription service. For additional information go to www.watersmeet.us. *Information collected during the enrollment process will only be used for emergency notification purposes.

BARBARA ELIZABETH FLEMING, went to heaven on February 23, 2024, surrounded by family in Anchorage, Alaska. She was born in Ewen, Michigan on October 17, 1933, to Alex "Tanglefoot" and Martha Tyyska. She was the daughter of Finnish immigrants and stayed true to her heritage. She possessed incredible Sisu, the Finnish art of inner strength. She didn't speak English until she started school, where she was forbidden to speak Finnish. Her dream was to become a nurse, but she was in a car accident right before she was to enter nursing school and her injuries prevented that from happening. She married her high school sweetheart, Jim Fleming, and they were blessed with five daughters, Jody, (Pease) Jennifer (Hromadka), Jamie (Berge), Jonnie (Ackiss) and Janelle (Sweeney).

At the age of 35, Jim was tragically killed in a multiple-fatality car crash while carpooling home from the White Pine Copper mine, leaving her with the five of us, ages 11 months to 15 years old, to raise on her own. She never remarried. Two years later, her father died, and she took in her mother, Grandma T, to live with us in "the house that Jim built". We were blessed to grow up in Ewen where the power of community support played a critical part in our upbringing. It truly did take a village. She and her sister-in-law and dear friend, Dorothy Miesbauer (Aunty D), were publishers of *The Ottawa Shopper*, an area-wide shoppers guide that kept Ewen and surrounding communities up-to-date on grocery and retail sales, community events, local For Sale items, wedding announcements, and more. AS HEARD FROM A LITTLE BIRD

BERGLAND: Michigan Congressman Jack Bergman visited the Lake Gogebic Senior Center last week. The Center was recently awarded a \$300,000 grant to renovate and repair the building that is home to the offices of the Lake Gogebic Senior Citizens Club, Inc. (LGSCC) and the Ontonagon County Commission on Aging (OCCOA). The Congressman spent his time at the Center meeting some of the staff, senior rep-



resentatives and board members, and about the renovation plans. Grant funding is supported through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program, which has the goal to build a strong, resilient, and equitable recovery by making investments that support long-term growth and opportunity.

WAKEFIELD/ WHITE PINE: Highland Copper (the Canadian company aiming to reopen the old White Pine copper mine under the project name, "Copper North") was recently approved to receive a \$50 million financing grant it requested from the state of Michigan's Strategic Fund Board. The requested grant is earmarked for use at the company's other mine project -the "Copperwood Mine" project, north of Wakefield. The funds will be used for supporting infrastructure investments at the Copperwood Project location, which are described as upgrades to County Road 519, enhanced cell phone and broadband services, and energy infrastructure improvements. There is a catch to the approval though. Highland Copper has until December 31, 2025, to show the state that it has at least \$150 million in capital toward the project before the state will disburse money,
