

THE PSYCHOLOGY OF LYING

Why do people lie? Such a simple question should come with a simple answer (but doesn't, unfortunately). There are indications, however, that most of us share the same the motives for telling lies. Data collected during interviews with children and from questionnaires completed by adults through a study conducted by the Paul Ekman Group suggests that telling lies occurs (at least in part) for one of nine reasons:

- To avoid being punished. The most frequently mentioned motivation for telling lies (by both children and adults). It's important to note that there were no significant differences for lies told to avoid punishment for a purposeful misdeed versus an honest mistake.
- To obtain a reward not otherwise readily obtainable. This is the second-most commonly mentioned motive. An example of this is falsely claiming work experience during a job interview to increase chances of hire.
- 3. To protect another person from being punished. As with lying to avoid personal punishment, motive does not change with intent. We've seen this occur between coworkers, friends, family, and even with strangers!
- To protect oneself from the threat of physical harm. This is different from being punished, for the threat of harm is not for a misdeed. An example would be a child who is home alone telling a stranger at the door that his father is asleep now and to come back later.
- To win the admiration of others. Telling lies to increase your popularity can range from "little white lies" to enhance a story being told, to creating an entirely new (fabricated) persona.
- To get out of an awkward social situation. Examples of how telling lies can look when motivated by this are claiming to have a babysitter problem to get out of a dull party, or ending a telephone conversation by saying there is someone at the door.
- To avoid embarrassment. The child who claims the wet seat resulted from water spilling, not from wetting her pants, is an example if the child did not fear punishment, only embarrassment.
- To maintain privacy without notifying others of that intention. For example, the couple who claims to have eloped because the cost of a wedding was beyond their means when, in reality, they were avoiding the obligation to invite their families.
- To exercise power over others by controlling the information the target has. Famously embodied by Hitler, this is arguably the most dangerous motive for telling lies.

The kind of lies that seem to be reserved for use by a small lot people are those falling under the category of "malicious envy" - associated with Machiavellian behaviors such as deception, sabotage, and spreading lies and rumors about the envied person. This will be no surprise to anyone who has ever been on the receiving end of sabotage, smear campaigns, or blatant misrepresentation by envious narcissistic people. Unlike benign envy which can motivate people to improve themselves, malicious envy is said to drive negative thoughts about the envied person, attentional focus on the competitor, and behaviors directed at undermining the other's performance or reputation. The typical target of such envy is anyone who poses a potential threat - especially an attractive, successful woman. If you have ever encountered a situation like this, know that this is not your fault. These types bully those they are threatened by. Don't dim your light to cater to their envy or shrink when you hear about their covert attempts to make you appear inadequate. In fact, take the attacks as an indication that you deserve to shine even more brightly and visibly. Cut ties with anyone who uses these tactics and stick to relationships with people who celebrate you and encourage you in becoming confident. If you get put down covertly or overtly by someone, remember that there is something wrong with them, not you. Their issues and insecurities are not your responsibility, and you are not obligated to shrink to meet their needs or stroke their ego.

RESULTS FROM WESTERN U.P. TOURISM STUDY

University of Michigan Economic Growth Institute recently shared its findings of their year-long economic impact study detailed on what the Western U.P. sees tourism-wise in a typical year. Some of the key findings were that most tourism occurs between June and September, and the median stay is four days on average. The information was gathered through online surveys.* Respondents stated reasons for visiting as 83% Leisure, and 21% Family, with 80% of the visitors being from the Midwest. Economic Growth Institute Director of Research Sarah Crane said these findings were based on self-reported data during the year. In the span of the year, the survey discovered that around \$350 million went towards tourism in the regions of Baraga, Gogebic, Houghton, Iron, Keweenaw, and Ontonagon counties.

Peak visitor estimates by month are June through October range from 200K to 390K visitors. Respondents said 19% were here visiting on day trips, and 81% overnight. Over 80% of all visitors reside in one of four states: Michigan 35.5%, Wisconsin 29.7%, Minnesota 10.3% and Illinois 8.7%. *Based on 1,337 responses, 4,008 visitors represented

EAT SAFE FISH - Michigan's Eat Safe Fish Guide

RISK OFTECTOR

There are many health benefits to eating fish. However, if you eat fish, you might also be eating chemicals — like mercury, PCBs, PFOS, or dioxins. You can't see or taste the chemicals that can cause health problems, but these chemicals can stay in your body for a long time and can even cause cancer. The Mich. Dept. of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) recom-

mends eating fish that are low in chemical contaminants. Use the *Eat Safe Fish Guide* (ESF Guide) to find fish that have been tested for chemicals and are safe to eat. The guide provides advice for the size range of fish that are typically caught and eaten. The guidelines are safe for everyone - including pregnant women, children, and those with illnesses, like cancer or diabetes. To get a free copy of the *Eat Safe Fish Guide* visit Michigan.gov/EatSafeFish or call MDHHS at 1-800-648-6942. Excerpts from the guide are shown on this page.

Lake of the Clouds fishing restricted to artificial lures only. It shall be unlawful to use or possess live bait, dead bait or organic or processed food at any time on the shore or water. No spearing, no possession of smallmouth bass.

Ontonagon R. no more than 1 walleye over 23" may be possessed in the daily possession limit.



Fishing license fees are waived for Mich. residents who are veterans with

100% disability or active-duty military. The special military fishing license is available at DNR Customer Service Centers and at license retail outlets statewide, and is valid for the license year.

Clean FISH FOR DINNER?

When you clean your fish, try trimming away as much of the fat as you can see. Some chemicals, like PCBs and dioxin, are stored in the fat. If you cut out the fat, you cut down on the chemicals in your fish. Just note, you can't remove mercury or PFOS from your fish by trimming. Mercury and PFOS are stored in the meat of the fish.

Cook

Not only is grilling or broiling your fish healthier than frying, it also helps to get rid of more chemical-carrying fat. When you cook a fish on a grate, any fat hiding inside the filet can melt and drip away from the fish. This removes even more of those harmful chemicals.



Free Suicide Prevention Training in Baraga on May 15

Copper Shores Outreach & Education, in conjunction with Keweenaw Support 4 Health Minds, is hosting free suicide prevention training on Wednesday, May 15, 2024 from 4 to 5:30 p.m. at the Ojibwa Community Library in Baraga. The event is provided at no cost to the public.

The training is called Question, Persuade, and Refer (QPR). People trained in QPR learn how to recognize the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to question, persuade and refer someone to help. These skills can empower someone to save a life. The QPR training will teach people to be a "gatekeeper." According to the Surgeon General's National Strategy for Suicide Prevention (2001), a gatekeeper is someone in a position to recognize a crisis and the warning signs that someone may be contemplating suicide.

Gatekeepers can be anyone, but include parents, friends, neighbors, teachers, ministers, doctors, nurses, office supervisors, squad leaders, foremen, police officers, advisors, caseworkers, firefighters, and many others who are strategically positioned to recognize and refer someone at risk of suicide. Gogebic Conservation was recently awarded MDNR's 2024 Upper Peninsula Deer Habitat Improvement Partnership Initiative. In order to improve deer habitat in Gogebic County, the Conservation District is distributing planting shares. There are two planting share options available. Applicants' property must be 20 acres or larger. Preference will be given to applicants close to a Deer Wintering Complex. Applicants are required to plant the seedlings, but planting tools are available for loan. Option 1 consists of 15 hard mast species seedlings (oak, butternut, etc), with tree protection tubes and stakes, 20 spruce or pine seedlings, and 30 wildlife shrub seedlings (elderberry, hazelnut, etc). Option 2 consists of 20 Northern white cedar plugs, with tree protection tubes and stakes, 20 spruce or pine seedlings, and 30 wildlife fruit and nut shrub seedlings. 
