THE ORIGINS OF MEMORIAL DAY

Three years after the U.S. Civil War ended, on May 5, 1868, the head of an organization of Union veterans — the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) — established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers. Maj. Gen. John A. Logan declared it should be May 30. It is believed the date was chosen because flowers would be in bloom all over the country. The first large observance was held that year at Arlington National Cemetery, across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C. The ceremonies centered around the mourning-draped veranda of the Arlington mansion, once the home of Gen. Robert E. Lee. Various Washington officials, including Gen. and Mrs. Ulysses S. Grant, presided over the ceremonies. After speeches, children from the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphan Home and members of the GAR made their way through the cemetery, strewing flowers on both Union and Confederate graves, reciting prayers and singing hymns.

However, prior to 1868, local springtime tributes to the Civil War dead already had been held in various places. One of the first occurred in Columbus, Miss., April 25, 1866, when a group of women visited a cemetery to decorate the graves of Confederate soldiers who had fallen in battle at Shiloh. Nearby were the graves of Union soldiers, neglected because they were the enemy. Disturbed at the sight of the bare graves, the women placed some of their flowers on those graves, as well. Today, cities in the North and the South claim to be the birthplace of Memorial Day in 1866. Both Macon and Columbus, Ga., claim the title, as well as Richmond, Va. The village of Boalsburg, Pa., claims it began there two years earlier. A stone in a Carbondale, Ill., cemetery carries the statement

that the first Decoration Day ceremony took place there on April 29, 1866. Carbondale was the wartime home of Gen. Logan. Approximately 25 places have been named in connection with the origin of Memorial Day, many of them in the South where most of the war dead were buried.

To ensure the sacrifices of America's fallen heroes are never forgotten, in December 2000, the U.S. Congress passed and the president signed into law "The National Moment of Remembrance Act," P.L. 106-579, creating the White House Commission on the National Moment of Remembrance. The commission's charter is to "encourage the people of the United States to give something back to their country, which provides them so much freedom and opportunity" by encouraging and coordinating commemorations in the United States of Memorial Day and the National Moment of Remembrance.

SMOKEY SKIES IN OUR AREA

Extensive winter snowfall deficits across much of Canada have set up the forested areas to our north for another record-breaking wildfire season. Raging Canadian wildfires means we will experience periodic poor air quality across the western U.P.

WHY IT MATTERS: Smokey air from the wildfires contains particle pollution, also known as soot. The more soot in the air, the worse the air quality. Many of the soot particles are no larger than one third the diameter of a hair - so small that they enter and lodge deep in the lungs. Wildfire smoke can irritate your eyes, nose, throat and lungs. It can make you cough and wheeze, and can make it hard to breathe. If you have asthma or another lung disease, or heart disease, inhaling wildfire smoke can be especially harmful.

PROTECT YOUR LUNGS: Staying indoors and reducing physical activity are the best ways to protect your lungs from wildfire smoke. Wearing a special mask (e.g., "N95") called a "particulate respirator" can also help protect your lungs from wildfire smoke.






Recap of Ontonagon County Conservation District May Meeting

ROCKLAND TWP: The May meeting of the Ontonagon Conservation District, Friday, May 10 at Rockland Township Hall was well attended with all five board members present, representatives from three of our partner organizations and even a guest. The main focus was a review of the recent tree/plant sale and looking forward to the summer plans. Summer meetings have been set: Friday June 14, 2:00, then the summer schedule, second Mondays at 7:00 pm (July 8, Aug 12, Sept 16) at Rockland Township Hall.

District manager, Anne Kretschmann, reported the tree sale to be a success. While the size of the individual orders was smaller than

last year with fewer of the premium fruit trees, the difference was more than compensated with more Ontonagon residents placing orders. Once all the bills have been paid, it is estimated that the Conservation District will net about \$3700 from the annual fundraiser.

Anne Collins, our partner from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) encouraged the district to build direct relationships with the nurseries and also emphasize native species that attract wild-life in the Sale. The NRCS has grant monies to support landowners in planting native species and improving forestlands for wildlife. Three county residents were successful in being approved for these grants this Spring and another county landowner won a grant to construct a high-tower (hoop house). [Names are withheld per privacy requirements.]

Mark Menigoz, Ottawa USFS liaison, explained the plans to study the survivorship of the plantings funded as part of the USFS Ash Grant project. There was some discussion of finding workers to assist in this year's planting, a challenge because of the "on-call" and short-term contract nature of the work. There is money in the grant to pay for workers if workers can be found. Interested residents or volunteers can apply on the district's website: (https://www.ontonagonconservationdistrict.com/)

To support the Conservation District's Mission: "Promote stewardship of natural resources through education, outreach, community partnerships, and management." Board President Talsma has committed to set up information booths at county events this summer. Do look for us and find out more about the Ontonagon Co. Conservation District at Old Victoria Days, Senior Fest, CopperFest and other events. In other business, board member Charle Burger presented his research on creating an HR instrument to more closely align employee evaluations with their contracts. He also requested support for travel expenses to the June 3-4 Legislation day in Lansing, which the board approved. The board also approved the Proposed Funding Resolution prepared by Talsma. She will present the resolution to the Ontonagon County Board of Commissioners at their May Meeting on May 21.

OASF Holds Annual Meeting

ONTONAGON, MI: The Ontonagon Area Scholarship Fund (OASF) board held its annual meeting on Wednesday, May 1, 2024, at the Ontonagon Area School Library. The board's officers were re-elected for another term and are as follows: President - Meredith Strong, Vice-President - Tammy Lancioni-Perrin, Secretary - Betsy Guilbault, Co-Treasurers, Willie DuPont and

The OASF was established in 1984 by three civic minded individuals from the Ontonagon area who wanted to provide an opportunity for Ontonagon Area School District graduates to continue their education after high school. They decided the best way to achieve this goal was to establish an endowment fund to grant annual scholarships in both good and bad financial times. The dream they started is now shared by hundreds of others and continues to grow today in the form of the "OASF Promise - Scholarships for All!" In this, the 40th year since it was founded, the foundation has provided more than \$457,250 to help graduates further their education.

Strong, the daughter of the late Lou Gregory, a former OASD Superintendent of Schools who was one of the founders of the foundation, says some of the students who have benefitted in the past have earned college degrees while others have obtained technical certifications. The foundation has grown to over a million dollars and is moving toward offering multi-year awards. The scholarships have grown from \$500 in the first year to over \$45,000 that will be awarded this year. With the rising costs of post-high school education, Strong says, "Now the challenge is to keep growing, because today's students need OASF assistance more than ever."

The OASF Board is composed of volunteers from the local communities served by the Ontonagon Area School District. Board members are interested in assisting local, qualifying graduates achieve their own goal of furthering their education. Many members from across the community have volunteered their time to serve on the OASF Board including current members





MICHIGAN DNR FISHING REPORT - MAY 15, 2024

- **Ontonagon River:** Activity on the river was extremely low. Fishing efforts are expected to see a great increase over the next few weeks. Reports suggest that few fish were being
- Ontonagon/Silver City/Union Bay: These ports saw a significant increase in anglers over the past week. Reports show that some coho salmon and brown trout were caught in low numbers in addition to increasing numbers of lake trout. Anglers had the best luck when trolling shallow waters. The fish cleaning station at the Ontonagon marina is now open for the sea-
- Black River Harbor: Fishing out of the harbor was reported to be decent. Anglers reported catching coho salmon, brown trout, lake trout and Chinook salmon in small numbers. Reports show fish were caught by those trolling shallow waters. Anglers described the bite as sporadic.
- Keweenaw Bay/Huron Bay: Fishing was reported to be steady. Anglers had luck fishing both from shore and from boats. Shore anglers were able to catch splake and rainbow trout. Boat anglers were successful during trolling and jigging trips, with jigging trips producing more fish in the form of lake trout and the trolling trips producing more salmon. Salmon were also found in some of the bays; however, the anglers had to work hard to find them. Jigging trips were successful with both cut bait and plain hooks, while trolling was entirely done with plain hooks and artificial baits. Try getting on the water early and trolling near shore for those morning trout and salmon!
- Traverse Bay/South Portage Entry Canal: Anglers had successful fishing trips while both trolling and jigging, with the focus being on salmon. These fishing events produced many more lake trout than salmon; however, a few coho and Chinook salmon were caught. Salmon were caught mostly during the morning in nearshore waters of varying depths. Lake trout were found primarily in 100 feet of water, biting on both natural and artificial baits, and were full of smelt at the surface. Follow bait in the water column and fish just off where you find them for the best lake trout fishing!



Don't forget that trout can see! Trout have excellent vision, so consider the following:

- Cast out far ahead of you to prevent the trout from seeing you.
- When wading, do so carefully and avoid rapid movement, which could spook the fish.
- Don't wear any shiny objects, including watches or tools on your
- Stay away from wearing bright colors - stick to dark browns and
- Remember that trout usually face into the current, so cast upstream.



The Ottawa National Forest RAC is Reforming

Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack appointed 15 people to serve on the new Ottawa National Forest Resource Advisory Committee (RAC) on February 12, 2024. The RAC consists of committee members representing varied interests and areas of expertise, who work collaboratively to improve working relationships among community members and National Forest personnel. The Ottawa National Forest Resource Advisory Committee (RAC) will be inviting public proposals to invest approximately \$780,000 of accumulated funds authorized by the Secure Rural Schools Act. Project proposals must benefit National Forest lands in Gogebic, Ontonagon, Iron, Baraga, Houghton and Marquette Counties that meet criteria for activities that improve natural resources. At least 50% of all project funds are to be used for projects that are primarily dedicated to road maintenance, decommissioning, or obliteration; or the restoration of streams and watersheds.

This year the Forest Service delivered \$736,302.73 of Title 1 funds to Gogebic, Ontonagon, Baraga, and Marquette Counties. Gogebic and Ontonagon Counties have selected Title II payments from the Secure Rural Schools Act Funds; these funds are to be used for RACrecommended projects that benefit National Forest lands.

The Ottawa NF RAC highly encourages consulting with Ottawa NF staff to develop projects and ensure you have accurate information for the RAC to consider. Examples of eligible projects include: Watershed restoration activities, Maintenance of roads or trails, Hazardous fuels reduction, Improvements in forest ecosystem health, Improvement of wildlife and fish habitat, Control of invasive plants and/or re-establishment of native species, Enhancement of National Forest recreation sites.

Proposals are welcome from any source. Individuals, tribes, businesses, non-profit organizations, and government agencies are eligible for funding consideration through grants, cooperative agreements, and traditional contracting procedures with the Ottawa National Forest. More information on how to propose a RAC project will come after the first meeting of the RAC, which is expected this spring. Contact Paul Holeva at Paul.
