


# THANK YOU!





## MOUNTAIN LIONS CLUB ANNUAL REPORT YEAR OF 2024-2025

The Mountain Lions Club had a good winter in 2024/2025. Snowfall was abundant, such that even now patchy snow remains on the Adventure Mountain Ski Hill.

Our skiing and sledding hill and ice rink at Adventure Mountain were plenty busy through the long winter. We were open on Friday nights from 5-9 p.m., Saturdays from noon-5 p.m., and Sundays from 1-5 p.m. Our 700-foot rope tow operated flawlessly throughout the winter, and our hill was nicely groomed. We will be purchasing a brand-new rope for next winter.

We run our winter operations on a strictly volunteer basis, and by the end of the winter season, we logged well over 1,000 volunteer hours and we served about 1200 people, averaging 33 per day. We set a record on Saturday, February 22, 2025 with 73 customers plying the ski hill and ice rink.

In summer, the Mountain Lions sell ice cream cones prior to the Greenland 4th of July Parade, and at the County Fair in late July we sell burgers, brats, and hot dogs.

We are hosting the Copper Shores Foundation Community Picnic on Sunday, July 20, 2025. This picnic features western UP nonprofits. The Mountain Lions donated to the following charities in 2024: Leader Dog for the Blind, Ontonagon County Cancer Association, Bay Cliff Health Camp, Barbara Kettle Gundlach Shelter, St Nicholas Project, American Legion Post 92 of Rockland, Hometown Christmas, Teaching Family Homes – UP, St Paul's Soup Kitchen, Greenland 4th of July, St Vincent de Paul, Greenland Township Christmas, Sonco Ambulance, Operation Graduation, Marine Corps League Toys for Area Youth, Greenland Township Fire Dept, and Lions Club International Disaster Fund.

Our President Mike Laakko passed away last month and there was much mourning. While Mike is irreplaceable, Chris Lakkala has stepped up and agreed to be our new President.





# MICHIGAN DNR FISHING REPORT-May 28, 2025

**Ontonagon River:** Angling efforts on the river were strong. Reports suggest that walleye were caught in good numbers. Trolling was the preferred method of fishing for most anglers with an occasional incidental reported catch of lake sturgeon.

**Ontonagon/Silver City/Union Bay:** Over the past week, these locations saw a good amount of angling effort. Reported catches consisted of coho salmon, chinook salmon, lake trout, and brown trout. These fish were caught in fair numbers by those trolling shallow waters. **Black River Harbor:** Angling efforts from the harbor were fair over the past week. Boats trolling shallow waters reported mixed catches consisting of coho salmon, chinook salmon, brown trout, and lake trout in low numbers. Shore and dock anglers also reported catches of northern pike within the harbor.

Little Bay de Noc: Yellow perch fishing was reported as good. Anglers saw schools of perch in shallows, as well as on the deep side of the drop off. Anglers fishing in the shallows used bobbers with live bait, while those in deeper water used jigs. Walleye anglers reported catches with varying degrees of success, with the most success near dusk and dawn. Fish were also caught drifting and trolling, using crawler harnesses and crank baits. Popular spots were near the head of the bay, the mouth of the Escanaba River, and south of the Ford River. Small-mouth bass fishing was also good; anglers used drop shots, tubes, jerk baits, and other minnow-like soft plastics. Anglers reported that most of the large lake bass have moved out of the rivers but are still reporting good numbers in the rivers. Anglers bass fishing in the lake targeted reeds and shallow rock structures with good success. Anglers also reported catching a few large pike.

**Big Bay de Noc:** Anglers reported good smallmouth bass fishing. Anglers caught fish in bays and near islands with good fishing near reeds and rock structures. Anglers targeting walleye reported fair fishing, although a low number of catches per angler.

**Keweenaw Bay/ Huron Bay:** Anglers reported catching coho salmon and occasionally chinook salmon while trolling crankbaits, spoons, and flies in the upper portion of the water column. Anglers jigging for lake trout and whitefish saw limited success.

Traverse Bay/Portage Entry: Anglers reported adequate catches of lake trout and whitefish

while jigging in deeper than 100 feet of water. Anglers trolling crank baits and flasher/flies caught both coho salmon and chinook salmon, although in small numbers.

At the May Watersmeet Township Board Meeting, the board approved a proposal from Coleman Engineering for \$5,000 to research, develop and write a 5-year plan for local roads.

Watersmeet Township was recently awarded a \$2,000 grant from the Gogebic Range Health Foundation. The grant funds will be used for the purchase of a new freezer, refrigerator, and transport bins. These items will be used to distribute meals to Senior Citizens. The appliances will be housed at the Watersmeet St. Vincent DePaul Food Pantry and the Food Pantry will distribute the meals.

Watersmeet will soon be receiving 160 frozen meals per month from the Gogebic-Ontonagon Community Action Agency. The meals will be distributed to Senior Citizens on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. The township hopes to begin the program in June. Watersmeet residents over age 60 qualify as Senior Citizens. The meals will be distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis.

The Lac Vieux Desert Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians is working on adding a full-time ambulance service providing service to the entire township. The Tribe's plans for constructing a new apartment building with 44 units is also underway. Funding for the \$15 million development comes from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority's Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC). Construction is targeted for completion by October 2026.







### 2025 Home Sales Trends in Ontonagon County Show Market Momentum

Ontonagon County's real estate market in 2025 is experiencing a notable upswing, marked by rising sale prices, faster transactions, and shifting dynamics between list and sale prices.

As of mid-year, the median home sale price stands at \$143,000, a significant 17.2% increase compared to the same time last year.
